Why the League Urges No on All the Amendments**

True to Tallahassee League tradition, this final Hot Topic before the election is devoted to exploring the Constitutional amendments. Marilyn Wills, Action Chair and Vice President of the League of Women Voters of Florida (LWVF), helped guide the LWVF board to oppose all 11 amendments. Marilyn also helped develop the impartial, education-only presentation on the amendments being given around the state by local League leaders, like our own LWVT President, Rebecca Sager.



At this evening meeting, Rebecca and Marilyn will explain the process by which the LWVF arrived at its position. Well-versed in the arguments for and against the amendments, Marilyn and Rebecca will then discuss the potential impacts of the proposed amendments on Florida's economy and civil society. Your insights and questions will further guide our civil discussion of great candor and urgency.

## President's Message

Are you, like me, dismayed by the news reports this week of falsified voter registration applications being turned in by a company paid \$1.3 million by the Florida Republican Party to register voters?

This is the same party whose leaders in 2011 pushed legislation purportedly to combat "voter fraud." That bill made it impossible for the League of Women Voters to help fellow citizens register to vote; fortunately that part of the law was struck down and we've returned to registering voters. But this same bill also requires you to update your out of county address change prior to Election Day if you want to cast a regular ballot. The LWVT is spending a lot of time and energy to combat the potentially deleterious effects of this new but unnecessary requirement so that every qualified voter in Leon County can cast a regular ballot.

The breaking news also got me thinking: "\$1.3 million dollars -- wow, that's a lot of money!" We register voters for free, because it is a privilege and a constitutional right to assist citizens in becoming engaged in our government.

**Here is what you can do to make a difference between now and Election Day, November 6, 2012.** You'll be in good company with many newly active members, who are great fun to meet, to share ideas with, to discover together new approaches to reaching out to the voting public.

1) **Be ready yourself, then spread the word.**

Visit [Vote411Leon.org](http://Vote411Leon.org). Look around at the tools there, see if this isn't the very best tool you've ever used to prepare yourself to make informed decisions about the whole ballot.

Then tell everyone you know or have ever met about [Vote411Leon.org](http://Vote411Leon.org); encourage them to use it, too; pass out Voter Outreach flyers advertising [Vote411Leon.org](http://Vote411Leon.org) at your community groups, yoga or exercise class, church, daycare, and so on. Copies of these Voter Outreach flyers are stocked in zip lock bags in my carport, at 1017 Cherokee Dr. 32301

2) **Engage directly in Voter Service.**

Send Janet Findling and me your interests, available times and the number of hours you want to volunteer between now and Nov 6. Based on your response, we'll schedule Voter Service Outreach Events to maximize our LWVT's efforts. A list of projects follows this article.

### Agenda:

1. Have voters check their registration status and update their address (prior to Nov 3 deadline).
2. Distribute voter guide outreach flyers (containing all the information they need to learn about the issues and candidates in order that they can vote the whole ballot with confidence this election).
3. Gather voter emails so that LWVT can follow up with voter education emails that research shows are key to getting voters to the polls.
4. Prior to the October 9 deadline for registering new voters, register as many new voters as possible, as well as providing them with the educational tools new voters need to confidently cast their ballot.
5. Educate voters on Amendments and Judicial Retention (using LWVF powerpoint presentation, and by distributing LWVF Special Edition Voters).

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### My League Story -- Queen Bruton

I was 27 years old when I first became aware of the League after moving to Jacksonville in 1959, so that my husband and I would be working in the same city.

My civic awareness had already been nurtured by my sorority, Delta Sigma Theta, through our Social Action Committee which addressed civic affairs in a very similar manner, but required us to share our energies with several other committees. On the other hand, the League was exclusively focused on civic issues.

Most of us had a civil rights legacy, and a *soror* who served on the City Council, Councilwoman Sallye Mathis, often kept us abreast of statistics compiled by the Jacksonville League that could strengthen our (NAACP'S) arguments for equitable treatment in the school system and in public accommodations. Sometimes we collaborated on voter registration also.

Fast forward 40 years, and I had returned to Tallahassee and moved sorority, political party and NAACP membership back to

Tallahassee; retired, but still interested in government. Intrigued by Hot Topics notices, I began attending the luncheons, but participated in only a few study sessions.

I accepted a board position this year, but, given my several leadership positions begging for more attention (Church Women United, Southern Christian Leadership Conference, and the Capital City Garden Club), I am extremely dubious about my ability to support the Board with an acceptable degree of fervor. But even though I'm now in my 80th year, my admiration for League action may provide me with sufficient energy to modestly assist in maintaining this very vital organization.

### Local Member Travels to Cuba with LWVF

Upon receiving the email announcing the Florida League of Women Voters' Sisters Across the Straits delegation to Cuba, something stirred. Having grown up in Miami during the 50's and 60's and having memories of the Cuban Revolution, Fidel Castro, Bay of Pigs, the Cuban Missile Crisis, and the resulting

flood of Cuban immigrants that affected my high school experience and the flavor of the city in which I grew up, Cuba has always had a special magic for me. Together with two high school friends who shared the same history as well as 21 other members from across the state, we journeyed to Miami, took a specially chartered flight, and spent a most interesting week in Cuba.

The People-to-People license under which the tour was authorized and which allowed us to fly directly from the United States to Cuba meant that there had to be an educational purpose to our trip. The series of interesting and involved professional Cuban women we met in a variety of interesting and educational settings (religious, environmental, literary, artistic, journalistic) provided many opportunities to explore the historical, political, and economic status of the island and have all our questions answered and our preconceptions rearranged. No two trips are quite the same. We traveled in a large and modern bus recently purchased from the Chinese, lodged at

the famous Hotel Nacional in Havana, and had most of our meals at state-owned restaurants sited in beautiful and historical settings. Kudos to Annie Betancourt for her incredible energy, remarkable contacts, and for assembling a unique and high quality tour.

The crumbling state of the spectacular architecture makes you sad and can perhaps overcolor your impatience with the political and economic decisions made by past and current political administrations. However, after a while, you realize that this is a country that has had a long and stormy history, struggled for centuries under the yoke of colonial and imperial powers, has made a valiant and largely successful effort to

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## Local Government Study and Action Group

*Local Government Group Takes Action on Its 2012-13 Plan*

At its September 9, 2012 meeting, the LWVT Local Government Study & Action Group followed up on an August planning meeting by agreeing to focus on four activities for the remainder of the 2012-13 League year. The activities were described in the last Voter and are briefly restated here along with action the group has taken related to each.

1. Develop a college/university student internship for observing city and county commission meetings and reporting back to our group. This activity was approved by the LWVT Board so we are all set to get going.
2. Follow and be involved in local land use planning. No action this month.
3. Continue to follow the transportation plan, Moving Tallahassee, and react to studies and proposals. On this front, group chairperson Ruth O'Donnell attended a presentation by the Florida Department of Transportation on September 12 during a City Commission meeting. FDOT explained the results and recommendations of a federal safety study of W. Tennessee St. from Monroe St. to Ocala Rd. Some components of this plan will be put into place fairly soon while others will not occur for more than a year.
4. We will participate in Sustainable Tallahassee through member Linda Davis' attendance at meetings of that group's Recycling Committee. Linda reported plans to attend their September meeting so we should have news from her in October.

Following up on our successful voter education activity in July, the Local Government Candidate Forum, we are attending forums this fall to ask some of the questions from the League's VOTE411Leon website. Our focus will be on candidates who have not yet responded in writing for posting on the site. Members Stuart Baker and Linda Davis are lined up to do some of this work. Thanks to our group member Lisa Sprague for helping us find out when forums are scheduled.

This free event will include youth presentations and community discussions on policy recommendations to eliminate hunger and to promote child health and wellness in Tallahassee/Leon County (<http://search.tallahassee.com/localevents/event/100/82811-2nd-Annual-Youth-Symposium-on-Food-Hunger-Opportunity-for-Policy-and-Change-and-Parent-Mini-Conference>). The LWVT is pleased to underwrite the printed program and host a League information table for the event. This event will replace our regular health care committee meeting for October.

The Capital Coalition for Health (MAPP committee) completed the community health assessment process begun August 2011 and reported to the Leon County community this past August 2012. An executive summary of the Leon County Community Health Assessment 2012-2017 reports "the issues of highest priority and worthy of inclusion in the Community Health Improvement Plan are: (1) obesity and chronic disease; (2) health disparities; and (3) access to health care. Important strategies to employ in addressing these issues will be to improve health education and communication, and strengthen partnerships and collaboration." 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## Education Committee

League members Shirley Ellis, Marty Monroe, Margie Thomas, Dolores Valdez and Cynthia Williams met on Monday, 10 September, to discuss their interest in presenting at least two education themed Hot Topics lunches or dinners, or other termed special information sessions in early 2013. The League Board approved the proposal.

In brief, the committee looks forward to inviting two speakers to each of the two sessions -- speakers who could represent differing points of view on the topics. Invited speakers would be presented with three to five areas or questions to address in their prepared remarks (speaking time for each to be about 20 minutes), leaving time for questions from the audience.

The first session would address, in general, curriculum and assessment, and would anticipate remarks relating to the "new" Common Core Curriculum and other student testing such NAEP and end of course examinations, teacher recruitment and training including "Teach for America," teacher evaluation and retention, the importance of early childhood education, graduation rates, and dropout prevention.

The second session would focus on funding for pre-K--12 public education and would include privatization of public schools including vouchers and charter schools, adequacy of state funding for public education, and local (city and county) funding.

Committee members discussed a variety of possible speakers, including a representative from the Leon County School District, the College of Education at FSU, the Institute for School Innovation, the Foundation for Florida's Future, Fund Education Now, the Florida School Superintendents Association, the Office of School Choice in the State Department of Education, the Florida School Board Association, and the James Madison Foundation.

The next meeting of the Education Committee will be held on Monday, October 8th, at 2:00 p.m. at 808 Wilmon Court.

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## **Registering Homeless Voters**

### *A Surprisingly Rewarding Activity*

When the League of Women Voters of Tallahassee was asked by Janet Hansen of Big Bend 211 to consider a voter registration drive at the Renaissance Community Center, I must admit that I was a bit reluctant. My thinking was that for people who have so little, registering to vote would not be high on their priority list.

However, after meeting with Mark Lazarus and seeing his enthusiasm for the project, the League set up a schedule to do a trial run.

The results have been exactly opposite of what I anticipated! So far, I have turned in 30 voter registration forms from guests of the Center and an additional 11 from residents of the Hope Community!

As Chuck White explained to me, the process of getting a voter card is a step toward having a normal life once again. It has been a very rewarding experience for the Tallahassee League volunteers, including Genny Rosenberg, Lisa Rutledge, Marty Monroe, Marilynn Wills, Erin Edwards and Louise Clay.

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## **Sustainable Thinking -- How to Dispose of Old Medications**

*The information in this article was provided by Carole Gentry, Education Coordinator, Office of Resource Stewardship, Leon County Solid Waste Management Facility*

You can dispose of old medicines yourself in one of two ways:

1. Cross out personal information on the prescription bottle (or remove label). Add sand, kitty litter or coffee grounds and some liquid to the bottle. Use duct tape to seal the bottle and then you can dispose of it in the regular garbage.

OR

2. Put ALL the medicines in a detergent bottle (the opaque ones that you can't see through), add sand, kitty litter or



coffee grounds and some liquid. Replace the cap and seal it with duct tape. This can go in the garbage, too. You can then take the prescription bottles (labels removed) to Publix. They will recycle the small prescription bottles. (Sometimes bottles that small literally "fall through the cracks" at the recycling centers.)

Periodically, the police department holds "medicine cabinet" events where old medicines are collected from citizens. The police department holds these events to help curb "pharming." That's what some kids do for thrills. They take medicine from their parents or grandparents, dump all of it in a bowl and then it's like roulette. They each take something to get a high. It's very dangerous.

One more thing: NEVER dispose of medicine by putting it down a drain or toilet. The drugs eventually get into the Aquifer and therefore our water. Scientists have found antibiotics, hormones and pain meds in the fish and seafood we eat.

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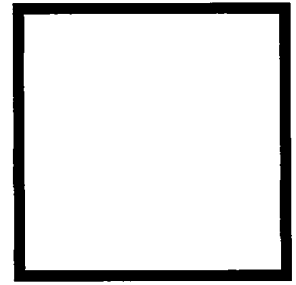
